Meet the new member - Lawrence Wilcock

Another two new members this week, Lawrence Wilcock and Steve Finch. Here's Lawrence:

Hi Martyn, Thanks for getting in contact. Here is a potted history of my dabbling in photography.

My first camera was a Kodak instamatic, a Christmas present in 1969, aged 5. I still have the camera and have recently scanned the slides, bringing childhood pictures back to life of my friends, parents, grandparents, and my great grandmother. Using this camera, I briefly dabbled with B&W darkroom developing and printing in my bedroom in the late-70's. I used the money from a paper round to buy an Olympus SLR, not long before I went to uni, but shamefully it lay almost unused until my honeymoon.

Over the years I have had a few film cameras - Canon 500N SLR, Canon Z70w 35mm compact, and a Kodak Advantix F350 APS point-and-shoot, all still in a cupboard. My first digital camera was the 4mp Canon Powershot G2 in 2001 (my most expensive camera purchase, and still working great), followed by a Canon 350D DSLR in 2005 (my current DSLR). After several, progressively more megapixel-endowed, digital compacts, I went mirrorless in 2013 with the Fujifilm X-A1. I have remained loyal to the brand since, valuing the small form-factor, and added an X-T10, and recently a used X-H1 (my first "semi-serious" camera), and several lenses.

Despite an early start and interest in photography, I have firmly been a casual snapper, primarily taking bad pictures of my family and holidays, always postponing an incipient photography interest into the future. I am hoping that the future is now, and that joining Cirencester camera club will inspire a concerted effort to improve my photography. At the very least to be intentional with my photographs, rather than simply pause and press. I am interested in street, documentary, travel, and landscape photography. My most admired "classic" photographers are people like Saul Leiter, Alex Webb, Steve McCurry, and Joel Meyerowitz, but I am sure there are many, many others I have yet to discover. I have been trying to teach myself Lightroom over the last 18 months but have far from mastered the subtleties of what is possible.

Meet the new member - Steve Finch

Hi Martyn, Many thanks for your email. I hope this helps

I am a retired (since June this year) university lecturer and live in Meysey Hampton with my wife Gail. Between us we have three children, now all grown up.

Like another Steve who has just joined, one of my first camera experiences was with my father's old Zenit (I think it was a Zenit B model) using slide film and then having to spend hours watching a slide show with the rest of the family when really all I wanted to do was go out with my mates!

Didn't really pick up another camera until my 30s when I had a number of second hand Nikon film cameras. In 2006 I bit the bullet and went digital with a Nikon D80 (10 whole megapixels!), then a few years later a Nikon D7200. Both were cropped sensor cameras so two years ago I made the decision to go full frame and mirrorless and bought a Nikon Z7II. Can't afford all the wonderful f2.8 glass Nikon are coming out with but luckily Nikon are now opening up the Z mount to certain third party manufacturers, which are cheaper. My latest purchase was a Tamron 70-300 which I experimented with during a week in Cornwall but have not had a chance to download the images yet.

I guess my main interest is Landscapes and Seascapes, but I also try and take macro, architecture and urban photos (I especially admire the ones taken by Matt Irwin in Melbourne - quite outstanding, some of them). Not really interested in abstract, wildlife and portraits although family and dogs seem to crop up quite regularly.

My biggest blind spot is seeing good compositions. As a scientist I think I missed out on the "artistic" gene. I have never been a member of a camera club so I hope to get inspiration from this one and especially the competitions.

Finally I am an Adobe subscriber so use mostly Lightroom Classic with the occasional dabble into Photoshop. I really feel that I have only scratched the surface of these programmes and have certainly not made best use of their potential.

I remember on a geography field trip to the Lake District one of our party accidentally dropped his Zenit down a steep stony Fell. Case on. He found it a few hundred feet down and it was still in working order!!

Club Competitions – Set Subject A-E Definitions

A: ABSTRACT

Abstract photography is the art of capturing subjects in such a way that does not attempt to represent external reality, but seeks to achieve its effect using shapes, forms, colours, and textures. It can encompass a huge variety of subject matter, take us out of our comfort zone, make us question what we see, or invite us to enter another realm. The subject matter is often implied or suggested rather than overtly and literally presented. Any image that is altered reality is acceptable.

B: REFLECTIONS

"Reflection photos refer to any shot, no matter what type of photography genre, that uses a reflective surface." This can be a landscape, building, water, windows etc.

C: URBAN or STREET PHOTOGRAPHY

Urban photography is a broad genre that can include <u>anything</u> within a built-up, <u>urban</u> environment, so the image must convey an aspect of a city or town. Your image must have been taken in a built-up urban environment but does <u>not</u> have to include people, so things like street signs, traffic, architecture, shop facades, light trails, crowds, bridges, are all part of urban life. Your image can be a candid shot of people i.e. Street Photography which is also accepted.

D: FOG / STEAM / MIST / SMOKE

This topic can include a wide variety of images, from misty morning landscapes to smoke wisps created at home – as long as the predominant effect / subject includes Steam or Mist or Smoke or Fog.

E: MULTIPLE EXPOSURES

Multiple exposure means superimposing two or more photos to create a completely new, different image either directly in the camera or afterwards in image processing.
