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
Club News

Monday 15th May - Wedding photography night - 7.00 pm

We've got a couple of bank holiday Mondays before, what might just be one of the highlights of the season. Yes, it's Liz's wedding photography night with a cast of thousands! Nothing like finishing off the season with a bang! Here's Liz to confirm what she said on Monday night:

Hello Mike and Martyn

Just following on from my brief summary on Monday night, I just want to be sure everyone knows the format for our wedding photography night on Monday 15th May.

- 1. I would like to <u>start at 7pm</u> to maximise the use of daylight.
- 2. I'm proposing to give a short presentation of my wedding photography experience using the projector including some group photography which will be no longer than half an hour.
- 3. I then have permission for us to use the church which will be opened up for our use they know we are doing a photography workshop so I'm hoping everyone will bring their cameras for a practical evening.
- 4. In terms of camera kit, my go to lenses are 24-70mm and 70-200mm. Flash is not allowed at weddings in a church but outside and in the 'reception' it's a bit more relaxed. I really only used flash as a 'fill in flash' when there was too much shadow on people's faces in group shots outside and 'bounce flash' should it be required indoors. Never really bothered with off camera flash unless I was using a soft box doing couple portrait shots and then only as a last resort. Everybody has different ways of working and of course cameras are pretty good in low light now.
- 5. There will be a bride and groom with a page boy and bridesmaid, mother and father of the bride, two guests and a "vicar". (Really! I have some very willing friends!!)
- 6. Hopefully, we'll be able to capture their arrival, a very short service, exit from the church, group shots and then some confetti shots too (I have real petal confetti to use).
- 7. The bridal party and guests will be treated to a glass of fizzy so we can try a few informal 'reception shots'. (It would be nice to do this outside if the weather is nice).
- 8. The bride's bouquet (put together by the bride as she is a florist it just gets better) and other details can then be photographed should anyone want to try that kind of photography.

- 9. The bridal party are all more than happy to have their photos taken, particularly the bride and groom so I'm hoping the club will come up with some great images for them!
- 10. I'm more than happy for club members to enter into the spirit of the occasion by dressing up for the occasion too.
- 11. I think it will be a great opportunity for members to try some people photography without fear even if they're not interested in weddings as such.
- 12. The bride will be borrowing a dress from the Cancer Research shop in town where I used to volunteer so I would really appreciate it if you make a small donation to support that cause at the event?

Hope this all meets with your approval. Can't wait to see everyone. It should be a fun night.

Oppo launches mobile photography contest

Oppo has just launched the Oppo Imagine IF Photography Awards with one of the biggest prizes for mobile photography competitions. Not only will the winners take home a cash prize of CNY160,000 (\$18,000) but they will also receive expert training and get to take part in an international photo exhibition. The Chinese tech manufacturer is responsible for the flagship Oppo Find N2 a foldable flip phone with a 50MP camera and the Oppo Find X5 Pro which combines two 50MP Hasselblad cameras. Oppo's Moto is "inspiration ahead" and by launching a photography competition aimed purely at camera phone photographers, the company is empowering those who don't have access to more expensive mirrorless cameras
