We've always tried to give a new perspective on photography from the more mainstream genres and I don't recall that we've had a talk on ICM and abstract/impressionistic photography for quite some time. Here's Dave Cahill to round up Andy's presentation and what's coming up next week:

Hi Martyn, here's a round up of last Monday and what's happening next week:

Abstract & Creative

We had a great turnout for our first external speaker of the season, an inspiring and entertaining presentation on 'in camera' creativity. Some good general advice was offered – know your camera, aim to get the composition and aspect ratio right ahead of the shot, very important for obtaining the effective 'in camera' multiple exposures that Andy was so enthusiastic about. Changing settings between exposures, especially the use of extreme colour temperatures, from cool/blue to warm/red produced some very striking images. A number of Intentional Camera Movement (ICM) 'recipes' were described, and produced some very impressionistic images, often when used in combination with the multiple exposure techniques. I think many of us will be wanting to experiment now – maybe another trip to Westonbirt or Batsford is required!



<u>Photographer Tom Calton adapted his Sony A7 IV to capture portraits through a 108-year-old</u> Kodak lens

Here's an interesting article with some links. A new portrait series by photographer Tom Calton was made by repurposing a 100-year-old camera lens to commemorate British World War One soldiers. During WWI soldiers were prohibited from using cameras and taking photographs of life in the trenches, however, many still did. They did so by using a small compact camera called the Kodak Vest Pocket film camera that was easy to conceal, and later became known as 'The soldier's camera'. Tom Calton, a photographer based in Peterborough, UK, has repurposed its otherwise fixed lens, adapting it to be used on a modern Sony mirrorless camera, in order to photograph a series of images that commemorate those who fought in the war, and those who defied instruction and photographed their experiences. Definitions of Set Subjects

Glass: Clear, broken, cut, coloured, stained, reflected, distorted, etc – this subject offers a huge range of creative ideas - be as imaginative as you dare! Ensure the main element / device / impression uses glass so the theme is obvious.

A Portrait: A portrait photograph is the capture of the likeness of a living person or creature in which the face and expression is predominant. The objective is to display the likeness, personality or the mood of the subject. The focus is the person's or creature's face, although the entire body may be included. A portrait is generally *not* a snapshot, but a composed image of a person or creature.

The Colour Wheel: Extremely colourful images are accepted in this category, using all the colours on the colour wheel, or create an image which uses complementary colours on the wheel for added impact (ie red / green, orange / blue, yellow /purple). The main impact of the image must be the use of colour to maximum effect. Search for Colour Theory on the internet for more information.

High Key / Low Key photography make use of lighting and contrast (or lack thereof) to create a specific mood. Most of the tones will be towards the **left** of the histogram for a **low key** image and towards the far **right** in a **high key** image. Again the internet has lots of useful articles and examples

Long Exposure: The image must show the effect of using a slow shutter speed and long exposure time – it must show an extended period of time, and that the image has been enhanced by the use of long exposure. Panning of moving subjects is allowed but other ICM techniques are not. Blur introduced through post processing is also not allowed.
