I was taken on the most wonderful surprise holiday to Canada by my family to celebrate a special birthday. One reason was my obsession with wanting to see beavers in the wild, so having spent several very early mornings at various possible locations throughout our three week trip, we chanced upon a 'Park' near our last stay - we asked the rangers if there were beavers on site - they looked at us as if we were asking someone in the UK if there were pigeons in London. Yes, there were beavers but didn't we know they were extremely secretive, shy and nocturnal?!

So off we hiked, to one of the several hundred lakes in this small park (!) and came across a tiny lake - with loads of dams, sawn down trees and loads of signs of activity - but no beavers.
