March 24<sup>th</sup>, 2021

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### **Club News**

Hi everyone. Hope you are all well. I write this on the anniversary of lockdown so it was good to see everyone on Monday. Sorry about the late change in the programme on Monday and I do hope we got the message out to everyone, particularly those who weren't going to attend the Permajet presentation. Just when you thought you were going to have a night off.....!

As the email from Louise at Permajet said:

### Good Morning Martyn,

I do hope you are keeping well and safe during these unprecedented times that we are all experiencing at the moment. Regretfully, I am writing to you as we have a slight problem with Colins presentation to you and your members this evening and we are going to have to postpone/move the evening to another date. Unfortunately, Colin damaged his knee about a month ago falling off a step ladder from his loft and it has been getting worse, but he has still been walking/hobbling on it. So, he had a MRI on Thursday last, and they discovered that he has shattered his bone in three places, so he is now on crutches and has to rest his leg for up to 4-6 weeks. He was still going to run the presentation from home for you with his leg up!!!, but he has just let me know that he now has a hospital appointment to see a knee specialist to see if he has to have an operation, so I am afraid we are going to have to postpone the evening for you. Sincere apologies that this situation has occurred as we never like to cancel any bookings but this is definitely a situation beyond our control. I would be grateful I if you could confirm that you have received my email and once again please accept our sincere apologies.

Louise was good enough to email the cancellation to everyone in addition to Mike's round robin email in the midst of his child care duties! and with Jill on the case with the Website and WhatApp Group, I think we got it covered. Ah, the wonders of social media. I noticed from Monday's night's talk that we had 26 club member attendees whereas the Permajet talk registered 20 of us so I guess we got through to everyone.

As you will recall, Permajet were offering us a discount code for purchase of their products on line which we would get on the night and would last a week. I'm aware that some of us were holding back to take advantage of this offer but of course that's now on hold. In view of this disappointment I'm proposing to ask Permajet if it could release the discount code now but before I do, could you let me know if you were going to take advantage of this offer so I can get a feeling for numbers before I go back to them. There's at least Mike, John S and I. If you can let us know before the end of the week, that would be great. That issue and the timing of the rescheduled talk has a bearing on whether we ask for a refund of the presentation fee which we've already paid.

In hunting round for a substitute speaker, I had seen the excellent Tom Way before and had him as a possible speaker for next season. Although his phone was busy, he was good enough to phone me straight back and it was really a stroke of luck that he was free. And what a great, professional, talk we had. It's always a bit humbling as a "hobbyist" to try and sum up a professional photographer's presentation, particularly one who is tuned in to trying merge what he likes in his photography with the need to put bread on the table. Although commercial in approach, I don't think he was going through the motions just to make living. He's clearly passionate about the images he's creating and it's a style the market likes. A perfect combination.

Tom was keen to stress that he is a wildlife photographer, not a digital artist. He takes it as he sees it, in part due to the restrictions in what is acceptable for wildlife competitions which form an important element of his work. I think his style and approach says everything about the components of a good image - his "three test" mantra being a) light, b) character and c) simplicity are ones we can all learn from. To me a combination of the use of monochrome (or desaturation) and a "tight in" approach definitely captures the character of an animal. As Tom said though, not all animals have a character which is easy to capture. The main bullet points I came away with (which may be obvious but are good reminders) are:

- 1. Shoot for yourself, not for a judge albeit that sometimes the objectives of both can become aligned.
- 2. Learn through trial & error.
- 3. Think on your feet.
- 4. Paint with light.
- 5. Capture the personality.
- 6. Less can be "more".
- 7. Attention to detail read the essential elements which characterise an animal or situation.
- 8. Know your settings.
- 9. Know your camera.
- 10. Don't be afraid to experiment with low light.
- 11. Read the context the relationship between your position (about to be trampled on by an elephant!) the subject and the background.
- 12. Don't be afraid to crank up the ISO if it's dark BUT shoot "to the right" in post processing, in managing noise, it's better to darken a high ISO lighter image than lighten a darker one.
- 13. Shoot "tight" to immerse one in the subject's character and maintain simplicity.
- 14. Shoot "wide" when you are looking at balance and composition as the principal ingredients of an image.
- 15. Some "tight" images might not portray context (it could be anywhere) so think about whether context is an important element as a backdrop.
- 16. Think about whether colour vs.. B&W as the former can be more distracting.
- 17. Consider using desaturation as an alternative to B & W.
- 18. Shoot in RAW, crop to suit, use the contrast slider to highlight tones and don't over sharpen. Be careful with the clarity and texture sliders.
- 19. In terms of printing, don't use paper that's too light. 280-310 gsm is a good weight.

The final piece of advice is to not critique your images immediately, or if you have, let time allow the opportunity to look at the images again. Your appreciation and skill in processing may change over time for the better. Let the image "breathe" for a re-critique later.
