Photographic Exhibition in Gloucester Cathedral 15th - 28th February 2025

An exhibition of photographs of Gloucestershire is being held in the cloisters of Gloucester Cathedral to showcase our beautiful county.

Camera Clubs from each of the 7 districts in the old county of Gloucestershire - Gloucester, Cheltenham, Cotswolds, Forest of Dean, Stroud, Tewkesbury and South Gloucestershire - are invited to take part.

Details of the exhibition and what each club is asked to do are on the attached sheet.

Please confirm by email to: <u>mhhsglos24@gmail.com</u> that your camera club would like to take part in this prestigious exhibition.

Each district will have 2 panels in the Cloisters to display photos of their own area, with descriptions of where the photograph was taken. Each panel is 160cm x 160cm.

Each camera club (or joint groups) will be asked to collate their own images - with captions.

Photos can be in colour or black and white; mounted or unmounted; and of any size, but able to be viewed from a few feet away. They can be old or recently taken photos, but they must be of their own council district. The Cathedral display team has recommended printing onto foam board for newly printed photographs.

Photos should be captioned: Name of photograph and location A short note about the area if relevant. Name of photographer Camera and technical details

The photos need to be attached to the boards with velcro fixings so the boards are not damaged.

At the start of the exhibition there will be an information board, explaining what the exhibition is about, with some information about each of the distinct areas. You can use your own display boards to advertise information about your club.

Set up day is Friday, 14th February. There is no parking in the Cathedral but permission will be given for vehicles to come in and drop off the photos. The exhibition can be taken down on Friday, 28th February.

External Exhibitions and Competitions

The winners of the Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2024 competition have been announced

It's the big one and as usual, the standard is (for want of a better word) obsessively amazing. The winners of the Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2024 competition have been announced, and this year's overall winner is an underwater image of tadpoles by Canadian Marine Conservation Photojournalist, Shane Gross. His image, 'The Swarm of Life', was selected from a 59,228 entries from 117 countries – the largest number of entrants the competition has ever seen – and the winners were announced at an awards ceremony at the UK's Natural History Museum in South Kensington, London. The 2025 competition is also now open now with the closing date being December 05 2024.

Snowboarding is not the first sport you think of when you think of the region, however, its snowboarding culture has thrived for decades. Starting as a subculture driven by a 'small band of misfits', British snowboarding shot to the mainstream in the 90s and 00s, before reaching stratospheric levels thanks to some exceptional homegrown talent showcasing their skills on the global stage. Definitions of Set Subjects

JOURNEY: A journey photograph is an image captured during the course of a journey or expedition, typically depicting scenes, landscapes, people, or moments encountered along the way. These photographs often aim to convey the essence of the journey, capturing the spirit of exploration, discovery, and adventure.

UK Flora, Fauna, Fungi: A flora, fauna, fungi photograph is an image that showcases plant life (flora), animal life (fauna), or fungi found in a particular ecosystem or habitat. These photographs aim to highlight the diversity, beauty, and intricacies of the natural world. They can range from close-up shots of individual species to wide-angle landscapes that capture entire ecosystems.

Golden/Blue Hour: During the golden hour, the sun is low in the sky, casting long shadows and creating a warm, diffused light that can enhance the colours and textures in a scene, often producing a soft, flattering glow. In contrast, the blue hour occurs just before sunrise or after sunset when the sky takes on a deep blue hue, creating a serene and tranquil atmosphere.

Still Life: A still life photograph is an image that portrays inanimate objects, typically arranged by the photographer to create a visually compelling composition. It can range from simple, minimalist compositions to more elaborate and stylized scenes, depending on the creative vision of the photographer.

Closed: A photograph with the title "closed" could depict a variety of subjects or scenes, but the title suggests a theme of closure, restriction, or inaccessibility.

Summer Cup (judged by members)

This is an informal competition which takes place during the 'off season' between June and September. Members can submit an image on one or all of the following subjects, which must be taken between May 20th 2024 and Sept 2nd 2024. These will then be judged by the other members at the start of the season. Images must be sent via the Club Dropbox before Monday 02 September 2024.

- 1. Small
- 2. Medium
- 3. Large

Ted Parrott Memorial Trophy (judged by members)
